### **President's Message**

Society of Parents of Children with Autistic Disorders (SOPAN) was started in 2002 with a mission of empowering lives of children and families with autism. Over the years, since inception, our services have expanded to include children with developmental disabilities and starting training programs to create human resources in this sector.

The years 2020-21 and 2021-22 have been difficult years for many due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent lockdowns. Many lives were lost and economies have been impacted. For SOPAN also they were challenging years. All our educational and therapeutic services moved to online mode of delivery. Many of our special students who could not cope with the online services, dropped out of our rolls. The good part of 2021-22, despite COVID-19 was the completion of our Project Shanay Autism Resource Centre at New Panvel. This project construction had star6ed in 2020 but had to be stopped due to COVID-19. SOPAN's donor partner Kotak Mahindra bank Limited (KMBL) supported us through this difficult period. The cost of the construction escalated due to the delay but the support from KMBL did not diminish. They gave us their expert advice from their team which deals with construction and helped us complete the project in 2021. A Navgraha puja was held to commemorate the finishing of the project in November 2021 which was done by the SOPAN Trustees and the patron Ms. Shanti Ekambaram. The Puja was attended by parents, children and all staff members of SOPAN.

An inaugural function was held in December 2021. Shri. Atul Bhatkhalkar MLA, Kandivali Mumbai was the chief guest and inaugurated the centre by cutting the ribbon and Shri Prashant Thakur MLA, Panvel was a guest of Honour of the function. Shri. Himanshu Nivsarkar CSR Group Kotak Mahindra Bank was the special guest of our function. Local compotators and other dignitaries attended the function.

The School and Training Unit (STU) started in November and started providing services to children with autism and developmental disabilities. A multi-disciplinary team of therapists and special educators at Shanay offer the services to the students.

The other projects of SOPAN have continued in the online mode till March 2022. Lockdown lifted in March and we started offline mode of education at our Jogeshwari centre too. The scars of COVID-19 are slowly receding and our team is back to providing the educational and therapeutic services like our pre-COVID-19 days.

Our human resource training programs intrig the B.ed in Special Education (Autism) which moved to online mode of service delivery, has now moved back to offline mode. During COVID-19, we have supported our families by providing grains, food cards and support through several webinars on mental health and other issues which have supported them through this difficult period. Many lessons were learnt by all of us during the difficult COVID-19 period. All of us learnt about online platforms can also work for specialized services like ours. There have been requests to continue with certain webinars online for parents as many can attend from the comfort of their homes. Some We are continuing with few webinars online to continue with training our parents. We happy that this difficult phase is behind us but the lessons learnt will remain.

### **About SOPAN**

SOPAN is a registered Public Trust and Society of parents who are committed to providing need-based services for children with autism and developmental disabilities and creating a network of support for their families. SOPAN was started in 2002 and has since become a well-known NGO within the disability sector in the country. SOPAN is registered under the Niti-Aayog portal as an NGO. In the recent change in Corporate Social Responsibility rules and regulations, SOPAN re-registered in all registrations as required by the new law. SOPAN manages several projects which work towards fulfilling our mission of empowering persons with autism, related developmental disabilities, and their families. Our services include:

- Screening and diagnosis of disabling conditions
- Providing early intervention and related therapies
- Special education and life skill training
- Respite care services for families
- Outreach programs (rural camps, mobile services etc.)
- Supporting inclusive education of children with disability in mainstream schools
- Conducting human resources training programs (through our college)
- Networking with similar organizations
- Liaising with local and national government for policy making
- Conducting awareness and advocacy campaigns



To fulfill our services, SOPAN manages several. These projects projects include 4 centres which educate and train children with autism and developmental disabilities at

Jogeshwari. The 4 centres provide services to varying ages and conditions of children with autism and disability. Shanay Autism Resource Centre at New Panvel which opened in November 2021 also provides the same services at

New Panvel. SOPAN's Suvidya Centre of Special Education is a College of Special Education affiliated to the University of Mumbai and recognized by the Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI). It runs the B.Ed. in Special Education (Autism Spectrum Disorders). In addition, Suvidya also offers a variety of human resource development programs and in-service training programs in the field of disability education.

One of SOPAN's main objectives is to spread awareness about autism and

disabilities inorder to garner community participation in order to achieve inclusion of persons with disabilities. Several community participatory activities are conducted throughout the year. Every year, the month of April is marked as World Autism Awareness



Month. At SOPAN, this month several programs are organized which are aimed at spreading awareness across Mumbai and this remained the same even though the pandemic. Similarly Disability week falls in December and many activities were conducted in December (virtually due to the pandemic).



Students of SOPAN participate in many interschool competitions and are also invited to showcase their abilities at various functions held by educational institutions and corporate houses. There were certain restrictions due to the global

pandemic but none that stopped SOPAN'S progress. All festivals and National days were celebrated online to make the students understand their importance and customs. The online celebrations helped families feel connected to the centre and they participated with enthusiasm.

SOPAN receives grants from corporate houses and foundations to support the educational program of its students enrolled under our various projects. This year too many corporates, despite the pandemic, supported SOPAN's projects and gave grants for some events. ### **SOPAN's projects**

- **A. Shanay Autism Resource Centre:** The centre started providing in November 2021. The centre has 3 units
- 1. Samarpan School and Training Unit (STU): Educational and therapeutic intervention with to children and provided autism Services include developmental disabilities. multi-disciplinary assessments, special education, intervention, family training, therapeutic guidance and counselling services. More than 30 students are already enrolled at the STU





2. Saesha

Respite Care Unit (SRCU): This unit is planned to provide short term care for around 8 persons with autism. Saesha is a short-term care unit for persons with autism. It aims to provide

parents much needed break from care giving. The 8-bed unit is a 24/7 residential care program available for families who need respite for a few days.

3. Research & Resource
Development (RRD) Unit: The
RRD unit will serve as a facility for
research and in-service and preservice programs for teachers.



Additionally, it will also provide training to parents and family members of children with autism.

In addition to the educational programs, all festivals and national days are celebrated to make children understand the importance of the events. In addition, the centre has become a resource centre for providing information on services about autism and disabilities. Several individuals and people from institutes have visited the centre. Networking with local organizations, the Panvel Municipal Corporation, local Social Welfare department and the nearby hospitals and clinics happens on an ongoing basis.



### B. <u>Samarpan Centre for Autism Spectrum</u> <u>Disorders</u>

Samarpan, the first project of SOPAN, began in 2003, and serves children with autism. It offers a range of services from screening, identification and differential diagnosis, psychoeducational assessment, early intervention program, group sessions, pre-vocational and vocational training. The program is supported by related services such as speech and language therapy, sensory Integration and occupational therapy, adaptive physical education, yoga, music and dance and movement therapy. At Samarpan, teaching strategies and interventions specific to children with autism are provided according to the need of the child. Samarpan enrols students with mild, moderate and severe autism. Samarpan is financially supported by Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives.

### Activities carried out in the year 2021-2022

 Due to the pandemic, all activities were carried online. In March 2022, lockdown was lifted and all educational and therapeutic sessions were moved to offline mode

During the pandemic till February 2022, the following activities were conducted:

• Regular online session (5 days a week) was conducted through WhatsApp video call/Google meet or zoom meet. A fixed time table was drawn for each and every student according to theavailability of the parents at home. Sessions were conducted between 9.30am to 7.30pm.




Special education- for some children for 30 mins, 45 mins and 1 hour according to their needs. All therapy sessions were conducted only for 30 mins.

• As per the students need the services

(Special education, Speech

therapy, Occupational Therapy, physiotherapy and physical education) were provided. Initially the children were assessed and then individualized educational plan was made for each and every student looking at their needs in the present situation and also according to the availability of resources at home. IEP was implementation by dividing the activities- 2 month planner was made.





 Dance and Movement therapy (DMT) sessions were conducted once a week for both parents and students together. DMT is conducted by DMT therapist Ms. Mudrika Awasthi on every Saturday for 45 minutes to 1 hour in two batches.

### C. Mahanagar Vishesh Shala (Divyangjan)

- The centre was closed till March 2022 due to the pandemic. In the month of March offline school was started for all students. Some students had shifted to another place during lockdown. So unfortunately, because of long distance they have left the school. But many new enrollments are taking place now.
- During the pandemic till March 2022, teachers taught the children in the online mode using different teaching techniques. The multidisciplinary team conducted regular online school via audio/video calls. To teach, pictures of worksheets, activities on YouTube links and other links were created to continue the education of the students. In the beginning of the academic year

in June 2021, the first 2 weeks were taken for re-evaluating each child. After re-evaluation, the Individuals plans were created. Everyday, sessions were conducted for each student online with the support of the parents. Parents had direct access to communicate with the class teacher, therapist for regular updates of their child. A timetable was prepared to conduct the teaching learning process smoothly. Parents were using homemade teaching material or things available at home for smooth delivery of curriculum.

Half yearly progress reports to the parents before Diwali vacation. After




vacation, we had started with the next half yearly curriculum (virtually).

- Counselling and guidance sessions were held for parents every month.
- Parent meetings with

the coordinator were held online regularly to discuss issues related to their child.

### **D. Sanket ICT Training Program**

Sanket commenced in 2015 and provides Computer and iPad Training unit for persons with Autism and Intellectual Disabilities residing in Mumbai. SANKET is a program designed to prepare adults with Autism and associated disorders to step into the world of employment. They are being trained to operate Computers independently and this will enable them to get employed in the sectors which deals in the areas of data entry, photo editing, creating pamphlets, greeting cards,



preparing data by surfing from browser, etc. This course adds major training in the core areas with respect to being independent of their basic needs, activities of daily living and performing life skills.

This year a new course was added to the regular classes called the Ability

Enhancement Multimedia Program (AEMP) done I collaboration with AIMS India. The program was conducted online thrice a week till March 2022.


The program continued offline in the classroom from March onwards. The training of the program includes the following:

Suvidya is a B.Ed college which conducts a 2 year specialization course on B.Ed in Autism Spectrum Disorder. The college organizes different programs, events, webinars and competitions in order to develop competencies and skills for student and faculty. These programs help in professional growth. 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




